Shea of the town of Westport, in the County of Jackson and State of Missouri, in consideration of the love and affection which I have and bear unto my wife Ann Pector Shea (formerly Ann Pector) and in consideration that the property hereinafter mentioned and described was received and came into my possession by my intermarriage with her, and for divers other good and valid considerations do hereby give, grant, confirm and assign unto my said wife, the following personal property consisting of slaves to wit: Solomon aged about eight years, and Posa or Prasanna his wife, aged about sixty years, Charles aged about thirty five years, Caroline aged about nineteen years and her child Vane or Abama aged about eight months John aged about fourteen years, and Andrew aged about twelve years.

To Have and to Hold the said slaves to her sole and separate use free from my control and liabilities, and also, from the control and liabilities of my husband, that she may hereafter have and to her heirs and assigns to their sole and use and benefit forever

also by these presents grant, bargain, sell and convey unto
the said party of the second, Lot One, Block D. 8, and Culpeper
subdivision of the City of Independence, as set forth on the
plat of the same recorded January 3rd 1859, together with
the perpetual right of way and unobstructed view of the
alley twenty feet wide on the east front of said lot,
to them and to their heirs together with all
the rights, immunities, privileges and appurtenances, to the
same belonging, unto the said party of the second part and
to her heirs and assigns forever, the said William William hereby
covenanting that himself, his heirs, executors and administrators
shall well and lawfully, and defend the title to the premises
