



Indigenous History Interpretation Intern

Wornall/Majors House Museums

Job Description

Our Indigenous History Research Intern is responsible for researching and creating a plan for interpreting indigenous history in a way that relates to Wornall/Majors House Museums' two historic sites: the John Wornall House and Alexander Majors House. This position reports to the Executive Director of Wornall/Majors House Museums.

Primary responsibilities include:

- Research and summarize indigenous history directly as it relates to the geographic area surrounding the Wornall and Majors Houses.
- Familiarize self with the history of the Wornall and Majors Houses and how their lives intersected with indigenous peoples.
- Create an interpretive plan with recommendations for interpreting indigenous history at the Wornall and Majors House, both in the short and long term.
- Plan and execute a public educational program or resource. This might include a short event, a field trip activity, or video series.

Requirements for Indigenous History Interpretation Intern

- Attention to detail and ability to develop and execute short- and long-term plans.
- Robust communication skills and ability to clearly convey information and timelines to WMHM staff and volunteers.
- Ability to work both individually and as a team member.
- Strong research and writing skills, including ability to think critically and ascertain validity of historic sources.
- Previous coursework in indigenous studies strongly preferred.

This role is ideal for a student majoring in history, indigenous studies, or museum studies.

Details

This internship takes place at the John Wornall House, 6115 Wornall Rd. Some hours may be completed remotely.

Internships are generally 10 hours per week for 16 weeks in the spring and fall or 20 hours/week for 8 weeks in the summer. Hours can be adjusted to fit specific internship program needs.



This is an unpaid internship unless the student is employed through their college or university. If the applicant is a UMKC student, this internship is eligible to be paid through UMKC's Mellon internship program.
